Partner Types

Check each ETC fund

Must be listed in the Application Form:

- Lead Partner (all)
- Full Partner (all)
- Associated Organisation (NWE, NPA, AA)*
- Advisory partners (IE only)
- Associated policy authority (IE only)
- Stakeholder groups (IE only)



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Tip: Consult the relevant ETC fund Programme Manual!



*Refers to ETC Funds:

NWE: Interreg North-West Europe, NPA: Interreg Northern Periphery and Arctic, AA: Atlantic Area, IE: Interreg Europe

Partner Eligibility



Check:

- 1. Is the Lead Partner profit making?
- 2. Do you have the right geographic coverage? (check each fund)
- 3. Are the partners correctly registered?
 - Proof of address, Irish bank a/c
- 4. Private partners (solvency checks)
- 5. Small partners (NGOs, SMEs, micro) solvency

Stakeholders

During **roll out** and for **long term effects**:

Partners: Can be full or associated/advisory

Target Groups: who will your project reach out to during the project?

- communications
- raise awareness/training -> behaviour change.

Stakeholders: Anyone impacted by, or who has an interest in, your project's roll out and results.



Example Consortium Design – basic ETC project



Example Project Design – basic ETC project







For every work package:

- 1. What are the activities? (comms, training, building)
- 2. Who are you targeting with these activities?
- 3. Who will do the work? (full partners)
- 4. Who needs to advise? (short and long term effects)

Outputs, Results

5. Risks/mitigations?



Example

- 1. Develop and roll out an app for real time public transport in rural areas
- 2. Rural areas: School pupils? Workers? Elderly?
- 3. Project partners: Local Authority might lead
- 4. Parents associations/schools/older citizens groups/ digital privacy experts (needs, wants, barriers)
- 5. Risks/mitigations? (older people don't want to use an app? Ask them what are the barriers?)



Horizontal Principles



- All projects must comply with the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights and CPR horizontal principles.
- Consider how your project might have consequences (intended or otherwise) for:
 - Sustainable development and no negative impact on the environment (Do No Significant Harm principle)
 - Equal opportunities and non-discrimination promote equal opportunities and prevent any discrimination based on sex, racial or ethnic origin, religion or belief, disability, age, or sexual orientation at every stage of its implementation.
 - Equality between men and women- promote equality between women and men and prevent any discrimination based on gender at all stages of its implementation



Horizontal Principles



- All about inclusion of people = all about stakeholders
- Risks and mitigation for your project

Stakeholder inclusion is key!

Real life example:

- A project developing an app to help older people in remote rural areas access real time GP care for a specific illness.
- They worked a lot with medics, hospitals and tech companies to design the app
- The tech company ran focus groups with elderly people in their own city.
- When they went to roll it out, they realised that digital literacy amongst elderly in **remote rural areas** was much lower than in the city, and elderly people were not willing to use the app.
