Communication Requirements for THRIVE

- Must acknowledge that National and EU support has been provided
- Must use the programme logo and funding statement on all physical and online communications elements
- Temporary signage highlighting ERDF support
- Permanent plaque on completion











Communication Requirements for THRIVE cont'd

- Dedicated webpage on Local Authority site
- Social Media posts using relevant hashtag
- Acknowledge Government of Ireland, EU and Managing Authorities on all promotional materials
- Managing Authorities to be invited to official openings, events, meetings and any announcements regarding projects













Programme Logos & Funding Statement: THRIVE

Local Authorities must use the logo strips and funding statement on communications & visibility material related to the co-funded activity, depending on the programme area location:

Programme logo strip and funding statement must be used on physical and online communications elements directly related to the ERDF co-funded activities, and be:

- prominently displayed on all communications and visibility activity related to THRIVE awards
- used in the format supplied and must not be recreated or modified in any way
- be in colour on websites and wherever possible on other materials related to the co-funded project
- be of equal size (in height or width) as the biggest of the other logos displayed with it.

MAs to provide a logo banners in all formats, horizontal and vertical presentations. Non-compliance with Communications Requirements can result in a loss of up to 3% of ERDF Funding

Background

The demesne of Myross Wood was purchased by Reverend Arthur Herbert (b. 1726, d. 1785 or 1818), Visar of Myross and husband to Helena Townsend (b. 1726, m. 1752. d. after 1785) of Castletownsend, and the stately 5-bay Georgian-styled Myross Wood House was likely built between 1752 - 1785. (Carria, 2020, p. 13)

The house was purchased by the Irish Missionaries' Society in 1946 and was used as a study house for young missionaries. The south wing was totally rebuilt in 1959 and the interior of the house has been adapted to the needs of the community over the years. The west wing was reconstructed and refurbished in 1987. But, apart from these relatively small modifications, the house remains as it was built by the Rev. Arthur Herbert in the 18th century and extended by the Earl of Kingston in the early 19th century. It stands on 100 acres of woodland and it has served as a community facility and retreat centre since 1970.

Myross Wood House is overlooking an inlet from the Celtic Sea (Figure 1 & Figure 2). The northern and western sections of the building are built into the hillside and are therefore more susceptible to rainwater run-off and excess moisture accumulation in the building fabric. (Carrig, 2020). It is a two-storey building with a floor area of approximately 1300m2.

Building Survey

Heating is provided by an oil boiler and distributed through radiators. The hot water also comes from the main system.

The house is considered historic but not protected. It has \$2 bedrooms most of which are sized for single occupancy. The construction is masonry (part cavity-1959) with artificial slate roofs over attic voids. The ground floor is part solid, and part suspended. The windows are generally double-glazed uPVC. The house is heated by oil heating and distributed through radiators and ventilated naturally. The hot water also comes from the main system.

Some Thermal improvements have been carried out to date as outlined in the report produced by Carrig Conservation. (Carrig, 2020, p. 9)

"Walls: Thin (approx. 10mm thick) insulation installed on the internal face of the external walls in the Community Room and Dining Room
